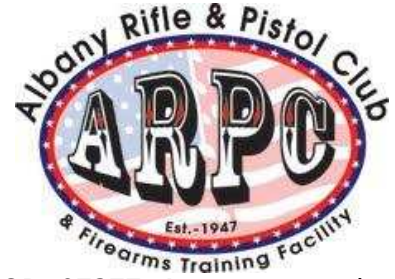


NEW MEMBER ORIENTATION

(Revised 4/14/11)



Welcome to Albany Rifle and Pistol Club, 29999 Saddle Butte Rd., Shedd, OR, 97377. As a new member you must go through an orientation that provides you with the safety information, policies, procedures and range layout of Albany Rifle and Pistol Club. Your orientation is in two parts; this written phase and a live orientation session. Once you complete both parts of the orientation and acquire your electronic gate card you will be able to use the club at your convenience. Please take some time and review the following material. Complete the final test at the end of the manual and bring it with you to a scheduled New Member Orientation briefing at Albany Rifle and Pistol Club. To schedule your orientation; go to the ARPC website, www.ARPC.info, click on the 'calendar button', pick a New Member Orientation, click on that event and call the instructor to let them know you want to attend. History

Albany Rifle and Pistol Club (ARPC) started shortly after World War II and held its 50th anniversary in July 1997. The idea of forming the club originated from a group of mostly handgun shooters who shot in the basement of Albany City Hall and later in the Swanson Recreation Building. In the 1960's Gene Nygren bought a 13 acre land parcel on the west side of Saddle Butte. This piece of land was previously used by the Oregon State Highway Department to provide fill for the I-5 freeway. In the 1980's property east of the range was obtained, including the north peak of Saddle Butte. Albany Rifle and Pistol Club is continually upgrading the club and it is considered one of the best regional shooting ranges and firearm training facilities in the Willamette Valley.

Organization

ARPC is a non-profit corporation affiliated with National Rifle Association and several other national shooting organizations. Facilities and equipment have been paid for by membership dues, use fees, gun shows and grants. The club is governed by an elected executive board consisting of President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Chief Instructor, Executive Officer and operates under the authority of the club's constitution and bylaws. A complete list of club officers, committee chairs, program directors and other important contact information is included in the club's monthly newsletter and on the club's website. The club website (www.ARPC.info) also contains a calendar of events, current range rules, and other pertinent information. Always check the website for calendar/scheduling updates before going to the range.

Dues and Fees

ARPC's annual renewal dues are due and payable twelve months from your sign-up date. Current annual dues are \$135 per year for individual memberships and \$203 per year for family memberships. ARPC operates through the efforts of member volunteer labor, hired services and employees. Annual dues can be reduced \$75 for individuals and \$113 for families by completing work bond work for the club. Every new member pays the work bond fee when they join the club and the fee can be waived from that point forward by completing at least 12 hours or more of approved club work during the membership year for individuals and 18 hours for families. Approved club work bond work includes such activities as club work parties, gun show work, range officer time and work at other organized club events. ARPC is closed to almost all shooting activities during the regular monthly work bond party on the 1st Saturday morning of each month, 8am to 12noon. Volunteer work at ARPC is optional and not required.

In addition, every new member pays a \$100 initiation fee and a one-time \$10 deposit for each electronic gate card. If you let your club membership lapse more than 30 days, your gate card will be turned off and you must contact the club office to renew your membership.

Juniors (younger than 18 years of age) can join ARPC as junior members for \$5. Junior benefits include free access to ARPC gun shows, full auto events and other benefits offered to adult members. In addition, junior members can upgrade their membership to an adult membership when they turn 18 years of age without paying the initiation fee. Junior members are issued a (non-electronic) membership card and are only allowed access to the club when supervised by an adult club member.

During the year, many firearm related classes are offered at ARPC. Many of these classes are free, however, some require a fee to pay for instructors, certifications and course materials. The club will always try to keep training fees to a minimum for members. Several shooting disciplines use ARPC for organized shooting events and most of these have an event fee to pay for targets, props, range use and sanction fees. Albany Rifle and Pistol Club use all dues and fees collected throughout the year to fund regular services, maintenance and range upgrades.

Access

ARPC is a private club, owned by the membership, and is normally accessible only to members and their guests. Access to the club is through the main gate using an electronic gate card. ARPC is open Monday through Friday 7am to 9pm and Saturday & Sunday 8am to 8pm. During special events, parts of the range may be open to non-members. Non-members shooting in special events are under the authority of the discipline director in charge of that event.

Members may bring any reasonable number of guests to the club, however, no more than two guests may shoot at any given time. The member who brings a guest is totally responsible for their guest's actions at all times. Members must have their guests sign-in in the main club house and each guest must wear a guest badge while on ARPC property. Note: Each regular club member is expected to wear his/her membership badge while on ARPC property. ARPC does not have staff at the range on a daily basis.

Facilities and Equipment

ARPC has six major shooting areas: the Main Range, the Indoor 22 Rimfire / Pellet gun Range, the Shotgun Range, the North Range, the East Range and the Archery Range. The covered Main Range is 100 yards wide and has target points out to 200 yards. The Indoor Range is a 50ft. 22 Rimfire / Pellet gun Range with 16 firing points. Note: an ARPC Range Officer must be present or check you into the Indoor Range. The Shotgun Range is located just north of the Main Range and has two battery powered trap machines available for member use when events are not taking place (clay birds are not provided). Note: Members must use club provided trap machines (hand throwers are not allowed) and shoot from the specified shooting areas. North Range bays are accessed by the east-west road just north of the Shotgun Range. The East Range has five shooting bays. Both the North and East Ranges are open to all calibers of firearms and members should shoot from within noise control structures where practical. The Archery Range has permanent 3D targets with 14 shooting positions and a 15 to 60 yard sight-in range. When ranges are operating, please show common courtesy and cooperate/ coordinate with other shooters. Members share space on all shooting ranges.

ARPC also has four classrooms that are used for various types of firearm training. These classrooms are located at the Main Range, Shotgun Range, North Range and Bay 3 (North Range).

At various times during the year, different ranges or portions of ranges are rented for special events, law enforcement training and special classes. Please watch your club calendar and check the website for special events before planning a trip to the club. All use fees paid by these organizations / events go back into the general fund to improve our club.

The Executive Board is constantly aware of balancing open member use against events and rentals that take up range space. It is very important to show community support but our first responsibility is to maintain access to individual club members.

SAFETY

Safety is the responsibility of every member and guest at Albany Rifle and Pistol Club. To safeguard members, guests, facilities and equipment, ARPC has established the following rules and procedures:

ALL RANGES

HOURS OF OPERATION: 7AM-9PM Monday through Friday, 8AM-8PM Saturday & Sunday.

1. Always keep firearms pointed in a safe direction.
2. Always keep your finger off the trigger until your sights are on the target and ready to fire.
3. Always keep the firearm unloaded until ready to shoot; ARPC is a "cold" range. All firearms must be unloaded except during use, with the following exceptions:
 - a. Law enforcement officers may carry loaded firearms to the extent required by their organizational written procedures; however, such firearms must be properly holstered or secured and may not be handled except in accordance with their written procedures.
 - b. Concealed firearms may be carried so long as they are neither visible nor apparent. Firearms carried under this provision may not be handled or if used on the range they must be handled according to standard range rules.
 - c. Loaded firearms may be holstered in order to practice drawing from a holster.
4. Uncased firearms must always have the actions open when not in use.
5. No person may go forward of a firing line except during an announced "cease-fire".
6. During a "cease-fire", no uncased firearms may be handled.
7. Eye and Ear protection is mandatory for all members and guests on any ARPC shooting range.
8. Commands of a Range Officer or event discipline Match Directors must be obeyed by everyone on that range.
9. Guests on ARPC property must be accompanied by a club member, who is then responsible for their actions. Members must sign in guests and guests must wear identification badges at all times. During special events competitors are not required to wear club or guest identification badges.
10. No alcoholic beverages or illicit drugs are permitted on ARPC facilities at any time.
11. Clean up after using a range by removing used targets, picking up empty cartridges, shot shell hulls and sweeping if necessary. Always leave the range in better shape than when you found it.
12. Informal shooting shall not interfere with scheduled events but may be permitted at the discretion of the scheduled event Match Director.
13. Steel core and tracer ammunition is prohibited on all ranges except by Executive Board approval.
14. Shoot only approved targets; no vegetables, fruit, or glass may be used as targets.

SPECIFIC RULES – MAIN RANGE

1. When calling a main range "cease-fire":
 - a. First, check with all persons on the firing line to make sure they are ready for a "cease-fire" then;
 - b. Press the red (top) button, which engages the audible and visible status indicators before anyone goes downrange and forward of the red firing line.
 - c. If anyone remains behind the firing line during a "cease-fire", they must stay behind the yellow line and not handle any uncased firearms.
 - d. Before turning off the "cease-fire" indicators, by pushing the black (bottom) button, make sure everyone is behind the firing line and that they understand the firing line is going "HOT".
2. All types of firearms are allowed on the main range including pistol, rifle, black powder, shotguns and full autos.
3. The metal plate rack at the south end of the main range is for **PISTOL ONLY**.
4. Full auto firing is permitted on the main range per the current conditional use permit:
 - a. Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays between 10am and 4pm.
 - b. Second and fifth Sundays and the first, third and fourth Saturdays of each month between 10am and 4pm.
 - c. During club scheduled full auto events.
5. Shoot only at targets attached to target boards or designated shooting targets. Do not shoot target frames, rocks or any other target not approved for use.

SPECIFIC RULES – NORTH, EAST & ARCHERY RANGES

1. All parking is on the north side of the road or at the end of the north range road..
2. All types of firearms are allowed on the north / east range including pistol, rifle, black powder, shotguns and full autos.
3. All "cease-fires" are verbal on the north / east range in all bays. All actions should be open when going downrange during a "cease-fire".
4. Metal targets may be used if a minimum shooting distance of 21 feet is maintained. Steel plate racks are for **PISTOLS ONLY**.
5. Firearms and broadhead arrows are prohibited in the archery area. Follow all posted rules.
6. Keep doors on bay buildings closed at all times and shoot from within the noise control structures when possible.

SPECIFIC RULES – INDOOR RANGE

1. Pellet guns and .22 caliber **RIM FIRE ONLY** firearms can be fired in the indoor range. .22 "Hyper Velocity" and .22 magnum ammunition is prohibited in the indoor range.
2. No one may go downrange of the firing line without Range Officer approval.
3. A Range Officer must check out all firearms taken into the indoor range to make sure they are of the proper caliber. The Range Officer will give you access to the range once your firearms have been checked.

SPECIFIC RULES – SHOTGUN RANGE

1. When shooting shotguns on the shotgun range make sure all shot falls downrange and not across the north range road berm or the main range berm.
2. Only ARPC clay bird throwers can be used on the shotgun range, no hand throwers are allowed.
3. A "cease-fire" on the main range does not mean there is a 'cease-fire" on the shotgun range or visa versa.
4. When shooting other firearms on the shotgun range only shoot at targets attached to the target boards or other approved targets. Do not shoot at target frames, rocks or any other target not approved for use.

MORE ON RANGE SAFETY AND ETIQUETTE

On any range, always check to be certain everyone understands what is happening. On the main range, **ALWAYS** use the buzzer-strobe system for calling a 'Cease-fire'. Be **ABSOLUTELY** certain that no one is down range or behind target frames when terminating a 'Cease-fire'.

Guests at ARPC do not always understand firearm handling procedures or range rules, please watch for:

1. Anyone handling firearms during a 'Cease-fire'.
2. Anyone pointing a firearm at another person, loaded or unloaded, always keep the muzzle pointed safe direction.
3. Anyone not covering sandbags to prevent muzzle blast or cylinder gap blast from burning or setting sandbags on fire.
4. Anyone attaching targets to targets support timbers (normally painted red) or using unauthorized targets.

If you notice smoke on any range during the summer, please notify a Range Officer or call 911. Emergency phone numbers and the physical address are posted at all ranges and facility buildings. After notifying the proper authorities, call any member of the Executive Board to report the incident, even if the fire is out.

In the event of any accident or medical emergency call 911 for help. The address of the club is **29999 Saddle Butte Rd, Shedd, OR, 97377**. After notifying the proper authorities, call any member of the Executive Board to report the incident.
