SELECTING A SURPLUS MAUSER RIFLE IN 9 STEPS

I hope this guide will help those who wish to buy a surplus Mauser rifle in their quest to acquire a good shooter or ensure that a collector's piece is serviceable. I've focused on Mausers in general and Turkish M38's in particular as there are currently a large number available for quite reasonable prices at gun shows, shops, and even some sporting goods stores like Big 5 and GI Joes. They are also quite a crap shoot as the Turks were quite frugal and tended to use the rifles they had until they were worn out, then spend the absolute minimum amount of money to return them to service.

M38 Turk's are large ring Mausers with small ring threads and barrel tenon. The Turk's didn't want to stock two sizes of replacement barrel and already had a slug of small ring Mausers which they had already rebarreled to 8x57 (I don't recommend shooting these small ring rifles with full-power loads-particularly the Turk surplus ammo presently on the market). This makes them about the easiest Mausers to drill and tap for 'scope mounts without breaking through into the receiver threads, because of the generously thick receiver ring. To be sure that you have an M38, rather than an earlier small-ring rifle, you will want the manufacturing date stamped on it to be 1938 or later (most were made in the '40's and will have a "K. Kale" inspector stamp).

Take your cleaning kit and longest rod with you as well as a bore light. Make sure you have some Sweet's 7.62, Birchwood Casey Gun Scrubber, RB17, RemClean, JB, or other powerful cleaner, preferably a strong ammonia/chemical cleaner (Sweet's, BC, RB17) AND a strong mechanical (JB, RemClean) one, as well as Ed's Red or some real light gun oil. I doubt the dealer will be upset by you cleaning up their stock.

- 1) Make absolutely sure that the rifle is unloaded and that there is not any ammunition within reach.
- 2) Cock the rifle by cycling the bolt then apply the safety. You should see the cocking piece move back just slightly as you do this. Pull and release the trigger. Disengage the safety. The sear should catch the cocking piece and the gun should remain cocked at this point. If the cocking piece and firing pin are released like you pulled the trigger,

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reject the rifle and let the shop owner know that the rifle is unsafe and WILL fire with the safety is released after the trigger is pulled.

- 3) Dry-fire the rifle, the trigger humps and receiver bearing surface were worn flat and deep, respectively, on couple I've had apart. If they are bad, you'll be able to tell as the trigger action will feel like there is about 1/2" of warm butter between your finger and the trigger that you squeeze through before the gun fires.
- 4) Remove the bolt and check that there is no or little play in the fit of the extractor collar to the bolt, or extractor to collar. Look at the back of the locking lugs you may be able to observe if there is poor (uneven) contact. Un-cock the bolt (you will need to re-cock it before reassembly) to observe if the firing pin tip exists and its condition fit in the bolt face and protrusion if it does. It should fit snug in the bolt face with little or no visible clearance, be round, smooth, and protrude about 1.5 x its diameter.
- 5) Check the rifling at the muzzle, the most common problems with these rifles is wear there. The lands should be strong, sharp, and parallel right out to the end. If you can get your hands on an 8mm projectile, you can stick the pointy end in the end muzzle and measure it's protrusion to gauge the wear. Note that it would be rude to do this with a loaded round in someone's shop. Also, if you are planning on "sporterizing" the barrel back to a modest 22-25" (from the current 29"), this is not an issue.

- 6) Check the stock for cracks behind the tang, at the toe, and around the recoil lug cross bolt. Check the handguard too.
- 7) If you plan on using the issue sights, check that they are not damaged or loose. After you try to twist the front sight base band on the barrel, give your best shot at twisting the barrel itself. I've found one that was loose in the action and heard of others.

- 7.5) Clean the chamber and bolt and check the headspace if you have a gauge.

- 8) If you've made it this far, the rifle is worth spending the time and effort to clean the bore and inspect it. I suggest a rotation of (all from the breech if your rod is long enough if it isn't buy one that is) harsh chemical cleaner on a patch pushed through, another short-stroked, a few strokes with a bore brush, dry patch pushed through, another if necessary, push through a patch soaked in ER, short stroking a patch of abrasive cleaner, short stroke an ER patch, push a dry patch through, another if necessary, then repeat the whole process as needed. Most will clean up in a 2-3 cycles. The really bad ones will chew your patch off your jag. The "sewer pipe" that I mentioned earlier was about 40-grit by my estimation. As the barrel gets close to being clean, pay attention to the resistance of the patch or brush as it goes through the bore. You want it smooth and even all the way through. As long as the rifling is strong, I'd take a frosty bore that feels smooth and even running a patch through over a bright, shiny one that grabs in a spot every time.

- 9) If you don't have headspace gauges, go have it checked. Since they cost less than \$20, the best bet would be to go in with some friends and get a "European Spec" or the longest you can find "field" gauge so you can take it with you. It will cost you more than the gauge to have one checked by a 'smith. The other option is to use a Stoney Point Headspace Comparator or something similar to monitor the headspace of fired rounds. It's not nearly as important that the headspace isn't too long as it is that it not increase. If headspace does increase at all on a rifle like these that is broken in, the integrity of the hardened surface of the bolt locking lugs or receiver recesses has been compromised and the receiver and/or bolt in question are useless and dangerous and should be destroyed. Most of these rifles have seen a few barrels and the bolts aren't necessarily original. Unless outrageously long, "excessive", but stable, headspace isn't much of a problem as long as reloading dies are adjusted to produce longer headspace ammo to match. Fire the damn thing secured on sandbags by sandbags with a lanyard the first few times using the hot Turk ammo regardless of how the headspace checks out. Don't let me scare you off. If the rifle made it through this far, you'll have in your possession more rifle than you could go out and buy for \$400.

THE SILHOUETTE PROGRAM HAS A CRITICAL NEED FOR SHOOTERS

The Silhouette program at the Albany Rifle and Pistol Club is in need of new shooters. I joined the club three years ago to assume the duties of Silhouette Match Director and to try to salvage a faltering shooting venue. The first thing we implemented was the addition of additional shooting opportunities for silhouette by the addition of Small Bore (22lr) and Field Pistol target lines. These allowed the use of 22lr handguns, as well as rifles, and the inclusion of many straight-walled, center-fire handguns shot to a maximum distance of 100 yards. We now offer targets for just about anything a shooter would bring to a match (velocity limited). We repaired many stands and targets, and have fought with target color as related to lighting and background (we settled on orange). I have set up and run tables at three of the ARPC gun shows in an effort to promote the sport and

have even offered a free match with gun and ammo provided.

We now have a good range, excellent target definition, and a wide range of shooting options, but what we lack is shooters.

We need 20 entries per match to cover minimum operating expenses, which are paint, sanction fees, and paying for target setters. Food, awards, and target and stand repairs increase these expenses. In order to operate the Silhouette program we need to make it financially sound. This can only be done by increasing revenue or decreasing expenses. The largest expense in a match is the target setters. They are at the range from 8:00 AM until about 3:00 PM for range set-up, the match, and range tear-down. We cannot run a match without target setters, and I doubt that we could find the volunteers needed for this work. Our expense for target setters is \$80 per match. This was the rate since before I became the match director and has not increased. Sanction fees to the International Handgun Metallic Silhouette Association, IHMSA, are \$1 per qualifying entry, and paint is running about \$12-\$15 per match.

We can increase revenue by increasing entry fees (currently \$6) or increasing participation. Since the target setters are paid a flat amount, plus tips, an increase in participation will only increase sanction fees and paint costs, both minimally. I have ruled out an increase in entry fees as the solution.

In the three years in which I have been the Silhouette Match Director at the ARPC, we have had 522 entries fired over 32 matches for an average of 16.3 entries per match. Eleven matches met our need of 20+ entries while the remaining 21 fell short, with the last four matches averaging 10.75 entries per match. This will not cover operating costs, let alone maintenance and improvements.

I have not scheduled any matches for next year as of the writing of this article. Our last match of this year will be on Sunday, December 12TH. If you are interested in the continuation of this shooting venue, I need you to contact me and let me know that you wish to participate. If enough interest is shown, I will schedule matches for the first four months of 2005 (on the 4TH Sundays). Your participation is what will determine what happens next. We have a good range, a dedicated Match Director, and plenty of shooting opportunities. What we need is you.

IMPROMPTU TURKEY SHOOT

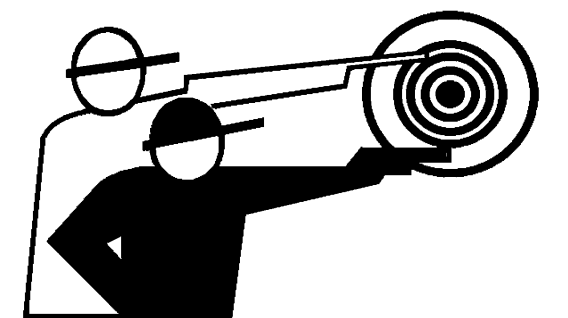
All of the guys in the club at the trap range decided to go ahead with having a turkey shoot. To a man it was well received. Even one of the nonmembers wants to help out.
