

Bowling Pins Frequently Asked Question (FAQ)

Why should I check out a bowling pin shoot?

It's fun knocking pins off a table in head-to-head competition. And you get to shoot every kind of gun you own, except full auto.

Do I need any special equipment?

No. Eye and ear protection, a gun and ammo suited to the type of competition that night, and a gun case or holster/scabbard for your gun in which to bring it to the line.

When do you shoot?

The 2nd and 4th Thursday nights of the month, March through September, at 6 pm. We will also have three (3) '9mm Novice' nights that shoot the 3rd Thursday of the month, May, July, and August.

What does it cost?

\$3. Juniors shoot free.

How does it work?

Five pins are set up on tables, with a steel drop plate on the ground alongside the table. The course of fire is to clear the 5 pins from the table, and then hit the steel drop plate, as quickly as possible. The competition is head-to-head – whoever drops their steel plate first, wins that round. The trick is to knock each pin off the table with a single shot – otherwise you will be chasing a lower profile (and possibly spinning) target!

What do you shoot?

On the 2nd Thursday of the month, we shoot centerfire handguns – you name it: revolvers and autoloaders, modern guns and classics, irons or optics.

The 4th Thursday of the month is 'something else' – e.g., rimfire pistol, rimfire rifle, centerfire long gun (rifles and shotguns), centerfire revolvers, centerfire subcompact handguns, combo centerfire handgun/centerfire long gun. On rimfire nights, we shoot pin tops, setting 9 pin tops on the table and using a lighter steel drop plate. On the '9mm Novice' nights – any handgun chambered in 9mm Luger.

What's a '9mm Novice' night?

A chance for shooters – especially shooters who may only have a 9mm – to compete against each other using similar equipment. '9mm' means 9mm Luger. 'Novice' means someone who has not won a centerfire handgun pin shoot. The pins are set further back on the table, to make clearing pins with a 9mm easier.

What's a 'Centerfire Subcompact' night?

A chance to shoot 'mouse guns' – subcompacts, typically in 380 or 9mm. We shoot pin tops at 10 yards with a full-size drop plate. We use a box to qualify the guns, 7 inches x 6 inches x 1½ inches. If the gun fits in the box, it qualifies. The objective is to shoot true subcompacts, excluding some of the newer 'subcompact' model variants that have grown to compact size or larger.

What's an 'Off Side' night?

On our regular centerfire handgun match July 9, everyone will shoot from their off or weak side. If you normally shoot with your right hand, you shoot with your left. If you normally shoot with your left hand, you shoot with your right.

How much ammo should I bring?

On centerfire nights, we load 6 rounds for each head-to-head matchup, with 12 rounds in reserve. On rimfire nights, we load 10 rounds, with 20 rounds in reserve. The shoots are double-elimination – you keep shooting until you lose twice, or win. So it depends on how many shooters we have each night – and how well or poorly you shoot. On most centerfire handgun nights, two boxes of cartridges are plenty.

Are juniors welcome?

Yes – especially on the rimfire rifle night, when they get their own class and compete against each other. On other nights, this is evaluated on a case-by-case basis, factoring in maturity, shooting experience, and parental supervision – contact the discipline director in advance to discuss. A parent or legal guardian needs to be present and sign the youth liability waiver, unless shooting under 4-H membership and leader oversight.

Any restrictions on guns or ammo?

Since we shoot in a bay – basically a steel box with one open side – we ask shooters to be sensitive about noise levels. No three inch 44 Magnums or muzzle brakes (porting and most compensators are okay) – just use common sense. No armor-piercing or steel-core ammo – they're hard on the pins, harder on the steel drop plates, and can be a safety issue with the steel plates.

Anything else to know?

Please be on time or be early! Our mandatory safety briefing starts at 6:00 pm. You need to be present at the safety briefing in order to shoot. In past years this has sometimes been an issue; we had extra ROs available to brief latecomers in a few cases, but want to avoid these situations in future.
